Mission and ethos

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The origins of Gunnersbury date back to 1919 when Fr William Roche began teaching 15 boys in a small hall adjoining St John's Church in Brentford. Each pupil paid school fees of 2/6d per week. Pressure on space spurred on the search for larger, permanent premises and the

Gunnersbury Avenue site was secured and the opening of Gunnersbury Catholic Grammar School took place on 21st January 1932 by Cardinal Bourne. Father Joseph Warren became Head of the new school of 105 boys in a building finished at a cost of £8,827. Rapid growth of our school was enabled through the bequest of £15,000 in 1934. This sum was left in the Will of Mr Patrick Murphy, former Chairman of the Brentford Board of Guardians.

In 1935, Father Warren retired and Father Robert McCliment became Headmaster. At this point the House system began to encourage friendly competition. The first houses were Bourne and Pole, followed by Warren and Roche. (At present we also have Newman and Dunstan Houses).

Under the leadership of the now Canon McCliment, the school flourished as an Aided School in 1939 and then as a Voluntary Aided School in 1949. Thousands of boys from Ruislip, Uxbridge, Harrow, Wembley, Hayes, Richmond, Acton, Hounslow and Ealing travelled to the Avenue site. In 1955 soccer was superseded by rugby as the main winter sport and Gunnersbury's First XV became known as formidable opposition.

After the retirement of Canon McCliment in 1957, Father Alex Groves led the school into the 1960s. The school operated as a split site from 1972-1984, far longer than planned. The original idea was that a new purpose built school be opened on The Ride site in Brentford to accommodate the newly enlarged comprehensive school. Father Chapman retired in 1977 and Michael Bovill became the first lay Head. It was under his leadership that Gunnersbury became a single site school again.

The new millennium saw a dramatic building programme which has greatly improved the experience of Gunnersbury students. Firstly a new Music Centre which accommodates a thriving Music Department, followed by a new purpose built Sixth Form Centre that has enabled the school to expand its highly successful Sixth Form and most recently our provision for the Arts has been greatly enhanced through the construction of the John Heffernan Stage. Our new sports complex and associated facilities have recently opened to provide further fantastic opportunities for our students.

Gunnersbury continues to follow in Fr Roche's footsteps developing well educated, rounded, successful Catholic young men who strive for the very highest, Ad Altiora.

In the lower years, all boys study Biology, Chemistry and Physics as separate sciences, computer coding and programming and a Modern Foreign Language. We are committed to academic excellence. Our curriculum, teaching methods and dedication to striving for excellence inspire a lifelong interest in learning and achievement for everyone in our community. Teachers and support staff are tireless in providing challenging and diverse learning opportunities. We recognise that every individual has a unique learning style, with different strengths and needs at various stages of their school life. We ensure that each student has access to facilities and resources to achieve his hopes and aspirations.

Academic life at Gunnersbury bristles with opportunity. Intellectual curiosity is nurtured through stimulating lessons, academic clubs and societies and strong co-curricular provision. We work in close partnership with Imperial College to offer boys an exciting range of opportunities to develop their passion for the sciences, mathematics and engineering further; these include the UK Biology Olympiad, lectures delivered by world-renowned scientists and researchers and hands-on masterclasses at Imperial College's state of the art laboratory facilities at their South Kensington campus. We make no excuse for being ambitious for all of our boys. Success in examinations provides future choice for each of our boys, it secures a range of possibilities and avenues.

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As a Catholic school, we believe and celebrate God's

Gospel values are central to all of our school life: we practise forgiveness, reconciliation, trust, honesty and mutual respect, secure in God's love for us.

We are very proud of the care our boys show for others. The charity work that pupils undertake is an active and visible way of learning to serve. Through the act of service we promote amongst pupils a greater sense of responsibility for their own actions, work, behaviour and thus increase their self-discipline.

As a Catholic school we have a specific mission that goes beyond providing an outstanding education. Essentially this means our most important aspect of our work is the development of kind, responsible, emotionally rounded young adults, who have a deep understanding of their Catholic faith and beliefs. The co-curricular programme is central to the all-round education that Gunnersbury provides. Our boys enthusiastically embrace this exceptional range of opportunities, developing their resilience, team work and leadership skills along the way.

> We also see this as a vital part of encouraging our boys to grow further and faster to occasionally take them completely out of their comfort zone. A multitude of clubs and societies flourish at Gunnersbury. These include local and national competitions, opportunities such as the Duke of Edinburgh Awards Scheme, enabling our boys each year to pit their determination and skill on white water activities, rock climbing or getting up on

stage to perform in front of their peers and parents in one of our many productions.

The sporting opportunities available at Gunnersbury play a central part in the curricular, co-curricular and social life of the school. All pupils take part in an extensive range of sports and physical education. The aim is to provide the opportunity to play sport at a high level but also to inculcate the benefits of regular exercise and the skills required for enjoyment of such activities in the future.

Gunnersbury boys can look forward to a horizon of opportunity beyond their academic learning. These activities can be pursued through subject based

events, such as theatre visits, exploring the Jurassic coast, or trips to the World War battlefields and the Science Museum and quickly expand into a range of opportunities such as photography, Trinity Guildhall Speech and Drama, cookery and visits further afield to Canada, the USA and Iceland.

Our technology department not only provides boys with the basic food skills for life, but also allows their creativity to take them to higher skill levels including competitive cookery and participation in the Young Chef competition. Similarly, taking part in the annual Eton College Engineering Challenge and BAA Young Engineers Challenge gives pupils a forum to shine, where their creative thinking talents produce winning results. The vibrant and purposeful atmosphere in our specialist art department gives a clue to the energy and commitment boys show when working in this subject. Our annual Art Exhibition routinely showcases work of an extremely high quality. Similarly, whether in the practice rooms, music classrooms, or on the stage, pupils work hard to master new musical skills.

We consider it our responsibility to help discover and nurture the distinct talents of each and every Gunnersbury boy and it is these exceptional talents that mark a Gunnersbury boy out from others. Gunnersbury is a school that aims for the highest, Ad Altiora, in all that our students do.





We pay close attention to understanding the motivations, strengths and ambitions of each of our boys, from the day they start until the day they leave us. The maintenance of a close three-way partnership (boy-parent-school) is vital to this process. The genuine support of Gunnersbury boys for one another and the mentoring of younger boys by older boys are much-cherished traditions of our school.

In each year group, pupils are in the care of their Form Tutor who has a crucial role to play in the provision of pastoral care. Form Tutors provide pupils with a point of daily contact, monitor pupils' work and welfare, and act as a channel through which information passes to and from pupils, parents and teachers. The fostering of positive, constructive relationships between home and school is seen as crucial. Boys are encouraged to be fully involved in school life and reach their full potential. All pupils are closely monitored by their Form Tutor and there is time each day for the Form Tutor to offer support and advice when needed.

Every boy is assigned to a House, when he joins Gunnersbury. These are Bourne, Roche, Newman, Warren, Pole and Dunstan – named after key people who have shaped the school's history. These people's lives and achievements represent that which we expect of young men: honesty; tolerance; compassion; drive; a thirst for knowledge; a willingness to sacrifice and a belief in scholarship. Everyone has a part to play in the life of their House and the contribution of an individual is valued. There are opportunities to represent the House in music, games, debating and a variety of other activities.

Pupils are supported in their academic study not only by their individual teachers and the Heads of Department, but also by their Form Tutor and Head of Year. A system of Headteacher Awards and merits points reward both individual pieces of outstanding work and continuous hard work and achievement. It is a central aim of our academic and co-curricular provision that pupils' efforts and achievement are recognised and celebrated.

In accordance with our mission statement, we provide a strong sense of wellbeing, belonging and security that affirms pupils in their dignity and worth, as well as helping pupils to achieve their full potential as a human person, physically, socially, intellectually, emotionally and spiritually. OFSTED have observed that 'a palpable feeling of respect and care permeates the entire site because staff and students consistently give of their best.'





Pastoral care

music is at the heart of school life in every aspect socially, academically and spiritually. Our Director of Music and his team are supported by visiting music teachers who offer individual tuition in piano, violin, guitar, saxophone, percussion, woodwind and voice.

The Music curriculum at Gunnersbury aims to provide a range of musical activity and experience with an emphasis on enjoyment, expression and development. Pupils extend their performing, composition and listening skills through singing, percussion and electronic keyboard work, as well having an introduction to music notation. We seek to support and encourage pupils' music-making. Individual weekly music lessons cover traditional classical instruments and more modern options, including bass, electric and acoustic guitar, percussion, and contemporary-style singing.

Apart from the joy that playing a musical instrument brings to those who play and everyone around them, there are other benefits that might not immediately come to mind. For example, both listening to music and playing an instrument can stimulate the brain; for a group or ensemble to make beautiful music, each player and section must learn how to listen to each other and play together, developing strong team skills.

The school maintains a strong choral tradition and our Chamber Choir sing a varied and challenging programme of music. The boys make regular visits and concerts out of school, performing over the year at Westminster Cathedral, in addition to Mass at parishes across the Diocese. Our Concert Band and Jazz Band tackle both standard and contemporary repertoire and give regular concerts in school and in a variety of other local venues. Gunnersbury soloists have regular opportunities to perform at the Royal Academy of Music and the Royal Opera House in Covent Garden.

The school hosts formal recitals and informal concerts are regularly given by pupils; joint productions with our Drama department take place at Christmas and at the end of the summer term. Through our alumni, who have gone on to attend the Royal Academy of Music, we have developed masterclasses, with extraordinary musicians from the Academy.

We strive to achieve our intention that, upon leaving Gunnersbury, our former pupils will continue to pursue their love of music and performing. Gunnersbury seeks to further the musical talents of our pupils throughout their lives, so that they have the desire and capacity to play in bands and orchestras, or just to enjoy playing at home.





Music

Sport is an integral part of a Gunnersbury education and success is achieved at the highest levels; our philosophy, however, is to enhance each individual's sense of belonging, achievement and self-confidence by offering a sports curriculum that develops strength, courage and competitiveness. We enjoy our many sporting successes yet we also pay tribute to the creativity and co-operative work of all our school teams, whatever the outcome. Selfconfidence, teamwork and a sense of achievement are qualities readily transferable to other areas of young men's lives and all Gunnersbury boys are involved in sport at some level.

> Gunnersbury is first and foremost a rugby school and we are very proud of our long tradition and success in the sport. Teams compete against schools drawn from a very competitive fixture list, supported not only by our in-house coaches, but by professionals from Saracens Rugby Club, with whom the school is partnered. Gunnersbury is also very fortunate to have been designated an indoor rowing hub, accredited by London Youth Rowing Association and, as such, we are in a very privileged position to able to provide free rowing coaching to club members after school. Our close proximity to the Thames enables students to spend substantial hours on the water.

As well as striving to achieve excellence on the sports field, we also believe in teaching an understanding of the role of sport and physical activity in achieving an active and healthy lifestyle. Competitive sport across an ever increasing range of disciplines – athletics, badminton, basketball, cricket, cross-country, fencing, football, hockey, martial arts, rowing, rugby, running, table tennis, tennis – is of the very highest standard.

The school's aim is to provide the very best sports tuition to our pupils and the recent announcement of funding from the Department of Education to rebuild our sports hall will enable the continued provision of outstanding sporting opportunities, education and enjoyment, not only to current, but to future students.

Many of our young sportsmen go on to compete at county, regional, national and international level. Most recently: William De St Croix beat all-comers to be crowned the Under 15 National Rowing Champion at the National Junior Indoor Rowing Championship (NJIRC); David Adeleye is making great progress in his journey to British Heavyweight Boxing Champion; Tariq Benson is impressing at London Irish Rugby Club; Toby Sibbick is starring at Scottish Premiership Lead Club Heats. However, sport is most definitely for all at Gunnersbury.

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We prepare pupils for entry to top universities, colleges and professions. The range of destinations reflects the diversity of our pupil body and recognition of the importance of tailoring courses to the individual.

> Within the Sixth Form, there are a wide range of 'A' levels available – Art, Biology, Business Studies, Chemistry, Design Technology, Economics, English Literature, French, Geography, History, Mathematics, Further Mathematics, Music, Physical Education, Physics, Psychology, Philosophy and Ethics. The academic rigour of 'A' level study is supplemented by a programme of talks and visits. We have established links with continental schools, and visits to theatres, galleries, and conferences in the UK and abroad are frequent. An extensive and age appropriate cocurricular provision of societies and opportunities complement the formal academic courses and extend pupils' interest in learning and discussion, through activity beyond the classroom.

> Inspired by the work of St Thomas Aquinas, we offer a bespoke programme of support that is open to all in our Sixth Form who aspire to Oxbridge or who aspire to a career in medicine, dentistry or veterinary medicine. Oxford and Cambridge look for candidates with a background in academically rigorous subjects; pupils who have had educational opportunities that have stretched them beyond the exam board specifications.

Our 'Aquinas Programme' has been designed to do just that, to nurture Gunnersbury's most able young men and women and to enable them to reach their potential in their chosen field. Our 'Aquinas Programme' seeks to empower participants to be confident, articulate, questioning and passionate about their studies. Those who take part will be guided and encouraged throughout the year by school staff and will receive expert tuition and support from colleagues working in the best universities in the country.

We have a long standing and close working relationship with Somerville College Oxford, Homerton College Cambridge, Imperial College, London School of Economics, Royal Holloway, UCL and King's College. These world leading institutions provide our Sixth Formers with access to a range of subject specific master classes and lectures, as well as mentoring programmes to support them in their work towards securing a place at the best universities.

Gunnersbury Sixth Form enjoys an enviable academic reputation, with outstanding annual results at 'A' Level. Our excellent track record in enabling former Aquinas scholars to secure a top Oxbridge and Russell Group place has shown us that these top universities and international companies want young people who are empathetic, resilient and selfdetermining. Our Sixth Form provision enables pupils to foster those qualities and attributes.
